I must admit I didn't realise I'd 'borrowed' so many of them. See below:-

Allegro: Radiator & thermo. fan; water pump; water pump hose to rad pipe; dashboard fresh air vents; thermostat housing; carb; CV joints; modified N/S drive shaft; front wheels; engine steady bar; reversing lamps; windscreen wiper 'box' O/S.

Austin 1300 GT :- servo unit

Mini :- 'door' mirrors (Mayfair); heater (air intake modified to other side)

Princess: wiper arm & blade; gas struts from bonnet for H bonnet; seat sub frames; air filter assembly (1800).

Triumph 1500 :- steering column; sun visors; rear view mirror; bonnet catches (2) & cable release; part of petrol tank filler pipe;

Ford Sierra Estate: Rear windscreen wiper/washer (arm modified and lengthened, 15"blade)

Ford escort MK 2: wheel centres and nut covers

Maxi: engine (1750); O/S drive shaft; steady bar; engine shock absorber; clutch side engine mountings; flexible pipe from clutch master cylinder to slave cylinder; speedo., fuel & temp guages etc; switches (series 2); remote change with rods shortened; wiring loom; 2 interior lights; underbonnet light; horns; exhaust (modified slightly); heater ON/OFF tap;

Scimitar :- 5" headlamp units;

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I hope anyone reading this drivel who is building/has built a wooden 4 or 6 will be encouraged to write a few words about any problems they encountered and how they overcame them, I for one would be interested.

Well mine's been called all sorts. For example: 'A greenhouse on wheels'; (How's your tomatoes doin'!!) 'The Popemobile'; 'A wooden hearse'; 'A sauna on wheels'; a boat on wheels; Anybody know of any more? If so why not drop Trevor a line and let us all know.

Splinters!

If anyone is about to buy some marine ply be very careful of the quality you purchase. I've just bought another sheet of 12mm from the same people that supplied me with the original sheets. It was delivered whilst I was out, but if I'd have been in, I would have sent it straight back!

The original 12mm sheets were '7' ply with a close grained veneer on both sides, but this new 12mm sheet was '5' ply with a very coarse veneer on both sides which splinters very easily. You need great care when cutting across the grain. You definately need to score the wood with a knife before you cut it. Where as the '7' ply you could get away with not having to score it if the saw you were cutting it with had a fine cutting blade in it therefore making it so much easier to work with.

The 18mm ply sheets originally supplied were also '7' ply so what I'm really trying to say is, that in my opinion, the '7' ply is a much better quality ply wood. It's easier to work with and gives a much smoother finish.

MOT Nightmares?

Well my Hustler's been on the road for nearly 12 months now and on the 24th Aug it sailed through it's second MOT without any problems, but you never can tell with MOT's can you?

Specialist Car Show - Queens Hall - Leeds - 13th & 14th September

Arrived at the Queens Hall just after 9 o'clock on the Saturday morning to find rather a smaller hall than anticipated and only a few cars and stands considering the show was opening to the public in less than an hour. But as the morning progressed a few more cars arrived and the "crowds" "streamed in"

Paul Lancaster's Hustler 6 was there 'FOR SALE' and he sold it in the first hour of opening!

The size of the hall is about $\frac{1}{4}$ of the size of one of the 3 big halls at Stoneleigh — and it wasn't full. Apparently the admission price was reduced on the Saturday because exhibitors who said they'd be coming hadn't arrived.

Heard a couple more comments about the wooden Hustler:- "it looks like a sideboard" and "a coffin with windows"!

The organisers had negotiated a very resonable rate for accommodation at the Ladbrooke Dragonara Hotel (****) which is situated just across the road from the Queens Hall. £15 each for a double room (£20 for a single) which included buffet breakfast (and I made sure I got my money's worth! and very nice it was to).

All the same we had a very enjoyable weekend and spoke to many interesting people.







