

Yet another warning based on a personal mishap - I seem to be thriving on them lately!

Not long after my wheel-sheering experience I became aware of a most poisonous smell emanating from my Force 4 - since I knew that the exhaust system was leaking and overdue for replacement (and that's another story in itself...) I just put up with the smell, opened all the windows and tried not to breath - much.

The second day it really was almost unbearable and I began to feel sick - danger signal! The smell was slightly like burning glassfibre by now, I thought, so I checked the exhaust system all over and found that there did not appear to be any signs of burning glassfibre even though parts of it were very hot near where the leakage was obvious.

The smell, my headaches and feeling of sickness grew and in the end I cut short a visit I was making and drove to a garage friend of mine. One sniff and he said, quite simply - 'Battery'. It was too. The alternator had been overcharging and 'cooking' the battery with the result that by the time the fault was discovered there was barely an inch of electrolite left in the battery - thank God there had been no sparkes in the engine compartment, or that I smoked (which I do not) otherwise there would have been a rather large flash and bang. The smell and health problems I had experienced were, of course, hydrogen poisoning. Be warned, fellow Hustlers, if you start smelling a mixture 'twixt burning glassfibre and exhaust fumes but cannot find any obvious causes, check you battery and alternator.
